Celebrating Austprem Inc. - A Real Support Resource



Experiencing the world of premature babies directly is incredibly hard. Coping with the ups and downs of the so called 'roller coaster' ride provides everyday challenges for parents and families trying to survive such an experience. Many people access different support networks and resources in an attempt to deal with

daily life. And as we live in an ever growing world of technology, using Internet-based websites and forums has become a popular means of finding information, support and friendship. Austprem Inc. is one of these Internet-based organisations but it offers more than just on-line support.

Austprem Inc. was started by a small group of mothers, each of whom had given birth to a premature baby. They recognised that there is very little support for parents of premature babies, and that this traumatic event can have a huge impact on the lives of the families involved. Austprem Inc. is an Internet-based organisation, however we do meet face-to-face as well. Austprem Inc. has the advantage of having a forum and regular chats on the Internet. The forum is always there, people can post questions and read over the answers and suggestions others have provided. Chats offer a chance to "talk" with others, without having to get dressed up, find a babysitter or juggle a baby or two and maybe an oxygen cylinder.

Both the forum and the chats offer a chance to share with others who understand. Often someone has experienced the same, or a similar condition or problem. We do not give medical advice, just support and a listening ear. Someone who has "been there, done that." Being able to talk without having to stop and translate the many medical terms that become a part of our children's lives is a great relief to many. Using the alphabet soup of acronyms and having people know what you are talking about without needing a dictionary really helps. This issue of Austprem Ink celebrates Austprem Inc. as a support group, with a focus on just two of its resources; the forum and chats.

Austprem Anthology - An Update

The Development Group members decided they would like to collate a book that shares premature baby experiences, whether it be the birth of the baby, taking the baby home or anything in general related to having a premature baby. Catrin Pitt posted a request on the forum for parents to share their stories. She writes:

Firstly I would like to thank all those parents who have spent time and energy to write their story with respect to having a prem baby. So far I have had 14 stories emailed to me. Each story tells of a heart warming, yet emotional journey through the minefield of having a premature birth. Each story tore at a parent's heart whilst the words were typed, yet each parent was grateful for the opportunity.

I know only too well how hard it is putting into words the journey we took. Even just writing the facts can release tears I thought had dried up years ago. My journey took place thirteen years ago, for some mums it took place only a few months ago. To all of you I am extremely appreciative of your efforts.

For those parents still writing or contemplating writing, please do so. We would like to have as many stories as we can, to show the wide range of experiences. Don't think that you have missed the deadline. We are still working out how best to present the stories we have.

Just imagine yourself back in the nursery, recovering from the shock of an unexpected delivery, coping with the newness and strangeness of the NICU. The beeps and bells of the equipment, the hushed voices of nurses, doctors and parents fills the room, rather than gurgles and squawks of newborn babies. Instead of holding your child to breast feed you hold a syringe



filled with the liquid gold that you squeezed out of your body. Everything is strange, unfriendly, frightening. You don't know what is happening, nor what will happen. And you are too afraid to ask. What if they give you the answer you don't want to hear?

Support Groups Online

Online communities date back to the early 1970s when the Internet was known to few. Since then the number of online groups has exploded with email lists and online forums now being available for almost every circumstance.

Support groups have long been seen as a great way for those in similar circumstances to share with others who have "been there" for mutual support and information provision¹. Online support groups are no different; although the members may be separated geographically, they still have common experiences that draw them together. Madara² tells how online groups share and enhance the benefits of face-to-face support groups, and have the added advantage of easy access at any time of day and night, including by those isolated geographically and those who may have difficulty getting out and about. Online groups also offer support 24/7; if the only time you can access others is in the middle of the night after a feed, you can leave a message then and read the responses the next night, or there may even be someone else up and you can "chat" with them in real time.

Some people find it easier to "open up" in an online group, where people don't "know" them except via their messages³. The degree of anonymity offered can make it easier to approach such subjects as post-natal depression and some of the feelings apparent during the rollercoaster ride of the NICU and SCN which may be more difficult to talk about face-to-face.

It is wise to check with a doctor before implementing anything read about on the Internet, just to be sure it is appropriate for you and your baby, but it can be very reassuring to hear that others have had similar experiences and how they coped. In this issue of Austprem Ink, you can read how some of the Austprem families have enjoyed the benefits of our online groups, and our face-to-face meetings. See the back cover for information about Austprem's online groups – join us and you will be warmly welcomed and have a wonderful opportunity to give and receive support.

Why Austprem?

The founders of Austprem all started off belonging to a different mailing list. t had a large number of members and there was much knowledge, support and information shared. All of us, however, felt that parents with premature babies in Australia would benefit from having a more local context to share our thoughts, feelings and needs.

The medical and schooling systems of different countries vary widely. Although there are differences within Australia also, we felt that there would be many benefits gained from those who had some understanding of the Australian Medicare and private health systems, specialists and referral processes, early intervention and waiting lists, as well as those who had battled through the preschool and schooling systems, trying to get funding if their child has ongoing needs, and many other scenarios, being able to share their knowledge with others.

It is also wonderful to be able to get together at times, either in small groups or larger ones, for "coffee" or a party, and being on a list that consists of people from the same country certainly makes this a little easier. Austprem families who travel interstate for holidays or to visit family often can arrange to meet up with other Austprem families from the area too.

Austprem Inc. now has almost 650 members from all over Australia. Some aren't members of any online Forum, they just receive Austprem Ink, and make contact from time to time when they need to. Most are members of at least one of the online Austprem Forums (Austprem, Austprem - Pregnancy Support Group and/or Austprem Prematurity in the Press) with all the benefits of sharing with those in the "same boat."

Messages and posts to the Austprem Forum aren't always directly prematurity related. Sometimes support is needed for another family member, a sibling of a prem, or just general parenting questions. All posts of this nature are welcomed - there are times when it can be difficult to know whether to treat your prem a bit differently given their tough start, and it helps to discuss this with others. I know when my full term baby son had to have surgery, the support I received from everyone on Austprem was fantastic. They understood what facing surgery meant, and were very reassuring. I have found many friends over my years on Austprem, they have supported me through much in my life. I didn't realise that having a prem would change both my life, and the lives of others, as much as it has.

If you have never joined an online Forum before, give it a try! It is easy to do, and as you can tell from this issue of Austprem Ink, there is plenty to be gained.

Austprem - Normalising Our Experience

Austprem (the web address was provided to me by a Monash NICU nurse shortly after Emily arrived) is an amazing support, buffer and resource for me and our whole family. Emily's surprise arrival at 27 weeks meant we were navigating unknown territory. We found the online Austprem community immediately welcoming to us; it normalised our experience and gave us a whole load of information about parenting prems. My husband Paul and I preferred to keep to ourselves a bit early on and having an online resource was non-confronting and accessible.

Each year in Australia, more than 16 000 babies are born prematurely. Around 6.5% of births occur before the 37th week of pregnancy and are therefore defined as premature, or preterm.

Austprem - A Place I Can Go

I'd have to say (and often do) to others that Austprem is a place where I can go no matter how I feel or what my children are doing. I can count on someone to offer a caring shoulder no matter where they are in the country. For me to have my needs and concerns answered from people who don't judge or know me, but do understand the depths of my emotional torture that my girls put me through each and every day. Raising children is hard enough but raising prems is something that nobody can possibly understand unless they have one (or more) of their own.

Austprem Inc. - The Forum Helped Me

I was absolutely devastated to find out that my Thomas had severe/profound hearing loss after his first ABR (Audio Brain-stem Response). I was given a number of web-based support services with forums I could access to cope with such a difficult 'consequence' of prematurity. I looked up these forums but I just couldn't participate in any discussions or forum posts. I felt that whilst Thomas had hearing loss, these people wouldn't understand all his other 'issues' and that the hearing loss was only one part of Tom. A brilliant mum on the Austprem forum who had been through what I was about to go through helped me like no one ever could. I still credit the Austprem forum and this one mum as my saviour - to this day!

Austprem - An Outlet for Pouring Emotions Kim Hutchinson

I was so happy to discover Austprem fairly soon after Erin was born. Erin was born at Westmead in Sydney and they don't have any kind of support group for parents with babies in the NICU there. I was the kind of person that just didn't want to talk to anybody about what I was feeling and going through unless they knew how I felt and had been through what I was feeling themselves. Austprem was a saviour to me as there were several mums that emailed me and offered their support to me and an ear to listen when I was feeling overwhelmed and very down. I was not like many mums wanting to get to know and develop friendships with other mums in the NICU, when I was in the NICU I was there for Erin and devoted all the time I was there to her and didn't get to know any of the other mums. I found all my emotions were concentrated on my baby and I just had no more left over to give to anybody else.

This did change as Erin became bigger and things became more positive for her and us. Anyway Austprem was my outlet for pouring out how I felt and I really don't think I'd be the stronger for it today without having had that release and understanding from other prem mums. Austprem to me was and still is like therapy :) I'm very, very glad it exists and that I found it soon after Erin's birth.

This is the most comprehensive book to be published on the subject of the emotional impacts of prematurity. The book is written especially for parents and family but NICU and follow up staff, as well as social workers, psychologists and family health workers will also find it both interesting and very helpful.

There are many quotes from parents throughout the book. These voices give depth and resonance to the situations and are answered in the compassion and practical advice given in every chapter. The authors are both psychologists, specialising in reproductive and perinatal loss. Debbie Davis has written a number of books in the past and these are all highly recommended.

At over 900 pages long, *Parenting Your Premature Baby and Child* is not the kind of book you can read straight through but it is definitely the kind of book you will come back to over and over again. The book has a very good table of contents and an index to help you find the information you are looking for.

When I think back to the hundreds of hours I spent sitting beside my own son's incubator, wondering what lay ahead for us all, I can only wish that I'd had this book to help pass the time and to help me feel less shocked and alone.

Joining the Online Groups
